Talk! Talk! Talk!

A statement I heard on a regular basis growing up went something like this: 'it's all just a lot of talk' or 'nothing but a lot of hot air.' There's something to be said for the need to back up one's words with actions. Authenticity and/or integrity are words used to describe the congruency of thoughts and actions or words and actions.

But sometimes that is used as an excuse to avoid talking. Sometimes it's important to have conversations that may or may not lead to specific actions but help groups of people move forward with more clarity and understanding.

For example, in my family we are having conversations about end-of-life decisions. 50-ish years ago these conversations were not as crucial as they are today; more options for health care, more mobility means less knowledge about opinions concerning end of life

care, all leading to more misunderstandings and more lawsuits and therefore the need to have decision makers on the same page, which often means putting these things in writing.

This is our context...and context is so important to understanding. Scripture has often been misinterpreted because we don't consider the context. Take Paul's letters: who is Paul writing to and what is the situation he is addressing. The stories of Jesus are being interpreted through 21st century context which means they are often misinterpreted as well. Let's take the role of women in the church. First, Jesus had apostles and disciples who were women. There is no dispute in this statement. Through the years church leaders have neglected the role of women in Jesus' life and the early church for reasons unknown. He may not have used that language, but they were treated as equals to the men who were apostles and disciples.

Think of Mary of Bethany who sat at Jesus' feet to learn from him-disciple; Mary Magdalene who was a messenger of the resurrection-an apostle. The main difference between a disciple and an apostle is that a disciple was a student of a particular teacher, and an apostle was a messenger of the teachers teaching.

Paul, on the other hand, may have said that women should keep silent in the church; however, he also enlisted women to plant/start churches and lead them as the Good News spread outside Jerusalem and Israel and "the ends of the earth." We recently heard about Euodia and Syntyche whom Paul referred to as those who "contended at my side in the cause of the gospel, along with Clement and the rest of my co-workers, whose names are in the book of life" (Phil. 4:3) Paul refers to these women as "co-workers."

My point isn't so much about the role of women in the church but in the practice of conversations. Maybe they are more than 'just talk' or 'just a lot of hot air.' As we move into the busiest season of the year, there will be All Hallow's Eve/Fall Festival celebrations, family Thanksgiving gatherings, Christmas parties as well as all of the Worship opportunities that accompany this 'most wonderful time of the year.' Will we sleepwalk through the season, or will we be intentional about having meaningful conversations where we see God?

More specifically: are we trying to recreate the past, focus on "doing" the things we always done, attempting to return to normal, i.e., the way things were before the pandemic, or are we having conversations to learn about contexts, i.e., the word became flesh. In good Lutheran fashion, can we do both? It's not an either/or but a both/and, e.g., simultaneously saints and sinners.

One of the main teachings about Jesus was that he was the incarnation, the word of God in the flesh. Every conversation is a chance to meet Jesus and therefore to have an encounter with God. Every gathering is an opportunity to experience the presence of God that is promised wherever two or three are gathered in his name. To gather in the name of Jesus is to be open to the presence of the Holy Spirit to uplift, encourage, support, carry one another's burdens, hear another's story/truth (woman at the well) and to give thanks to God for that moment in time in which the resurrected Christ was encountered. May this Holiday Season be one of meaningful, holy, intentional conversations-may the word become flesh and dwell among us!

A REMINDER: SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 19TH, IS THANKOFFERING SUNDAY.

WHAT IS A THANKOFFERING?

He (Jesus) sat down opposite the treasury, and watched the crowd putting money into the treasury. Many rich people put in large sums. A poor widow came and put in two small copper coins (mites), which are worth a penny. Then he called his disciples and said to them, "Truly I tell you, this poor widow has put in more than all those who are contributing to the treasury. For all of them have contributed out of their abundance; but she out of her poverty has put in everything she had, all she had to live on." Mark 12:41-44 NIV

The story of the Widow's Mite may have been the inspiration for the Thankoffering. The idea of Lutheran women collecting donations in small offering boxes goes back to the very early 1800s, when women formed "mite" or "cent" societies to raise money. Mite boxes or Thankoffering boxes were given to the women of the church to place in a special location in their homes as a visible reminder of blessings received. Women would add coins to those boxes as particular blessings were noted. From their use came the idea of an annual church service to celebrate their collection, and so the women of the congregation would come together for a Thankoffering service.

As the Worship Committee has worked on planning this year's Thankoffering service, many in our congregation have mentioned that they remember the little boxes and bringing them to church the evening before Thanksgiving. It truly shows how a little bit set aside can grow to something significant, especially when we work together.

This year's Thankoffering service will be led by the women of our church and special guest speaker Linda Pollard will deliver a message and sing. The many ways that the women in our church have contributed their time and talents will be highlighted. Refreshments will be served after the service. The vintage Thankoffering box is located in the foyer and will be used in the service. If you desire to contribute to the Women of the ELCA, please use the designated envelopes which will be in the foyer next to the Thankoffering box.


Zion's Country Walk
